How long long you have to to file an insurance claim after a car accident varies. Make sure you check the wording of your car insurance policy carefully as these time periods can be anything from two days to two weeks after the accident. You should always inform your car insurance company about an accident, even if you don't want to make a claim.

What To Do If You Have A Car Accident - Which?

You'll need to show your certificate of insurance. If you don't have it with you, you'll have 7 days to take it to whichever police station you nominate when you report the accident. Remember that it's not enough to report the accident to the police by phone and you can ' t ask someone else to report for you.
