A theory of film

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Between the 1890s and the 1930s, movie going became an established feature of everyday life across America. Movies constituted an enormous visual data bank and changed the way artist and public alike interpreted images. This book explores modern painting as a response to, and an appropriation of, the aesthetic possibilities pried open by cinema from its invention until the outbreak of World War II, when both the art world and the film industry changed substantially. Artists were watching movies, filmmakers studied fine arts; the membrane between media was porous, allowing for fluid exchange. Each chapter focuses on a suite of films and paintings, broken down into facets and then reassembled to elucidate the distinctive art-film nexus at successive historic moments.

Artists' Film offers a lucid, accessible account of artists' unique contribution to the art of the moving image in the twentieth and early twenty-first centuries. The visual image is the common denominator of cinema and painting, and indeed many filmmakers have used the imagery of paintings to shape or enrich the meaning of their films. In this discerning new approach to cinema studies, Angela Dalle Vacche discusses how the use of pictorial sources in film enables eight filmmakers to comment on the interplay between the arts, on the dialectic of word and image, on the relationship between artistic creativity and sexual difference, and on the tension between tradition and modernity. Specifically, Dalle Vacche explores Jean-Luc Godard's iconophobia (*Pierrot Le Fou*) and Andrei Tarkovsky's iconophilia (*Andrei Rublev*), Kenji Mizoguchi's split allegiances between East and West (*Five Women around Utamaro*), Michelangelo Antonioni's melodramatic sensibility (*Red Desert*), Eric Rohmer's project to convey interiority through images (*The Marquise of O*), F. W. Murnau's debt to Romantic landscape painting (*Nosferatu*), Vincente Minnelli's affinities with American Abstract Expressionism (*An American in Paris*), and Alain Cavalier's use of still life and the close-up to explore the realms of mysticism and femininity (*Thérèse*). While addressing issues of influence and intentionality, Dalle Vacche concludes that intertextuality is central to an appreciation of the dialogical nature of the filmic medium, which, in appropriating or rejecting art history, defines itself in relation to national traditions and broadly shared visual cultures.

Film is an art form with a language and an aesthetic all its own, and since 1979 David Bordwell and Kristin Thompson's *Film Art* has been the most respected introduction to the art and analysis of cinema. In the new seventh edition, *Film Art* continues its commitment to providing the best introduction to the fundamentals of serious film study - images throughout the book are collected from actual film frames, not from production stills or advertising photos - but the book has been extensively re-designed to improve readability and teachability. Additionally, the text can be packaged with the award-winning *Film, Form, and Culture* CD-ROM, and is supported by an extensive Instructor's Manual and text-specific website.

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
