After the divorce and the second marriage to each other, Diego Rivera and Frida Kahlo continued their stormy romance as if they never spent time apart. In the painting The Love Embrace of the Universe (1949), Frida depicted their relationship as a mischievous game of playing mother and son. Diego loved to be pampered, and Frida found that playing the role of mother perfectly resonated with his flashy personality.
