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Go to Author-Date Style Source citations in the Turabian manual come in two varieties: (1) notes and bibliography (or simply notes) and (2) author-date. These two systems are also sometimes referred to as Chicago-style citations, because they are the same as the ones presented in The Chicago Manual of Style.

□ Label the first page Bibliography at the top of the page, do not repeat the title on subsequent pages. □ Leave two blank lines between the title and the first item listed and one blank line between items. □ Bibliographic entries use hanging indentation. □ Arrange the list alphabetically by the last name of the author or editor.
